ALWAYS BETTER TO BE PREPARED

We love this Electrolyte Replacement Formula from Animal Wellness dog health writer, Audi Donamor. It is recommended for dogs and cats suffering from diarrhea, dehydration, heat stress, or physical exhaustion.

2 cups water

1 tbsp unrefined sea salt

1/4 tsp liquid colloidal trace minerals (can be found at a health food store)

1/2 cup raw, unpasteurized honey

Allow your pet to drink freely "or" use a spoon/ eye dropper, etc. Provide 1 tablespoon per 5 pounds body weight, every 2 to 3 hours.


Helping a hero dog . . . or maybe just his dad

It is always sobering when we receive an application for one of our Working Dog Cancer Treatment grants (grants.landofpuregold.com).

Our foundation grants are \$500 per individual working dog, of any breed, the reimbursements provided directly to respective veterinary personnel .Applicants must be active working dogs, in the areas of assistance, search & rescue, enforcement, or animal-assisted therapy.

Our latest recipient is our first Police K9, an 8-year-old German Shepherd named Xantho. For 5 years, Xantho has worked 40 hours a week, engaged in police patrol and narcotics detection with the Little Rock, Arkansas Police Dept.

But, he has now been sidelined due to a recently discovered hemangiosarcoma. Famous for his repeated bravery and success, his partner, Officer James Tankersley is far from alone in grieving this diagnosis.



Hemangiosarcoma, not detected until it's too late

This incurable disease progresses slowly and usually goes undiagnosed until the late stages of disease.

An aggressive cancer that arises from the blood vessels, it is primarily seen in the spleen, liver, heart, and skin. The splenic form is occasionally diagnosed by palpation of a large mass in the abdomen, but more commonly dogs acutely develop symptoms of sudden blood loss.

This blood loss results from the rupture of the fragile tumor and a resulting loss of blood into the abdomen. The dog becomes weak or collapses, many owners opting to have the spleen removed in order to save his/her life during the bleeding crisis. The average survival following surgery alone is around 2 ½ months, and with the addition of chemotherapy, around 6 months. The exception is with skin lesions which have a lower metastatic rate & thus longer survival rate.

A study by the Oregon State University College of Veterinary Medicine and the Oregon Health & Science University Cancer Institute may one day help both canines and humans with this form of cancer. Brian Druker, MD, director of the OHSU Cancer Institute who discovered the targeted therapy drug Gleevec for chronic myeloid leukemia (CML), teamed up with OSU vet-

erinary oncologist and researcher Stuart Helfand, DVM. Dr. Helfand discovered abnormalities in hemangiosarcoma growth pathways similar to those responsible for CML in humans.

Hemangiosarcomas strike all dog breeds, but is more often evidenced in German Shepherds and Goldens. Thanks to this grant, the Druker Laboratory is studying a cell line developed in Helfand's laboratory from a German Shepherd that died of this sarcoma. The researchers want to see what drugs can be developed to treat this disease. In turn, this research may ultimately benefit people with similar cancers.

A Penn Veterinary Medicine study is looking at the effects of Traditional Chinese Medicine, I'm Yunity, on the morbidity and mortality associated with surgically-treated splenic hemangiosarcoma. I'm Yunity contains polysaccharopeptide (PSP), which is isolated from a cultivated strain of the Coriolus Versicolor mushroom.

PSP may have benefits for survival and quality of life in cancer patients. Human clinical trials have shown an increase in the activity of natural killer cells, production of interleukin-2 and increased ratio of helper T-cells to cytotoxic T-cells when compared to a control group. Responsible Organic Health

We believe that health issues arise from all of the preservatives, sugars, heavy processing, antibiotics, growth hormones, and harmful insecticides and chemical fertilizers in food production. Although higher costs are the initial objection to going organic, many remain unaware of the critical differences between organic and non-organic products.

For instance, the fruits and vegetables that our parents ate when they were growing up were far more nutritious than the ones we will serve our children. And studies have shown that pesticides, fungicides, and the chemical compounds utilized to prolong shelf life for non-organic fruits and vegetables, are cancer causing and sources of immune system damage.

It Really All Starts with Food


We utilize a 100% organic home-cooked canine diet that includes fresh whole ingredients such as meats, whole grains, eggs, vegetables, and fruits, which is actually similar to our own nutritional regimens.

These basic food groups, so detailed by Drs. Pitcairn and Goldstein, are critical to good health. And, while some believe a dog's diet should consist of only raw meat and bones, it is important to understand that wild canines get much needed nutrients from the stomach contents of their herbivorous prey—such as deer, who eat grains and berries.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

Dr. David A. Dzanis, in his article, Interpreting Pet Food Labels, indicates that the term 'natural' is often used on pet food labels, although that term does not have an official definition. Generally, 'natural' can be construed as equivalent to a lack of artificial flavors, colors, or preservatives in the product. Yet, artificial flavors are rarely employed and artificial colors aren't really necessary, except to please the pet owner's eye. If used, they must be from approved sources, the same as for human foods. 'Natural' is not the same as 'organic.' The latter term refers to the conditions under which the plants were grown or animals were raised. There are no official rules governing the labeling of organic foods for pets.


- **15-19:** I will be happy to work with you, but I think our differences may cause some challenges. You might be more comfortable with another vet.

Earth Friendly Pet Products

Environmentally friendly (also ecofriendly, nature friendly, and green) are synonyms used to refer to goods that are considered to inflict minimal or no harm on the environment. To make consumers aware, the products may be marked with eco-labels. But because there is no single standard for this concept, these labels are too vague to be meaningful. So, look for those businesses dedicated to sustainable fair trade principles, and that use organic, dye-free, and/or reclaimed materials.

One such company is Barkwheats, who uses the *berry*, buckwheat, for their biscuits. Handmade in Stockton Springs, Maine, these gluten-free and grain-free wonders are made with



organic and local ingredients from neighboring organic farms in Maine, and family farms with Sustainable Harvest International in Belize. Barkwheats packaging is 100% compostable, biscuits enclosed in packaging made from sustainably harvested cottonwood trees and 100% recycled paperboard. They also compost, recycle, purchase wind energy, use CFL bulbs and select the most energy efficient equipment to run their facility. Find these great treats and more at:
